Why Belong to a Club

The following article, written by George Bolliger from Ryebuck, was published in the last issue of Mulga Wire, the BMC magazine. Obviously, BMC members already have seen it, but I thought it was spot on, so wanted to reproduce it here for our own members, Thanks, George for your permission. You can tell him what you thought of it at the next dance.

“There are many reasons why people elect to belong to a club. Some do so to get cheap member admission to various events; others do so to identify with and support the aims of the club. In most clubs there are a large number of “silent” members – happy to belong, but for varying reasons not wanting to become further engaged in active membership.

All clubs have a small group of active members that promote and engage in the pursuits of that particular club. Very often, these people are recognised for their service to the club with life memberships. It is unfortunate that these life members often retire and move away to become part of the “silent” membership

Any club is only as good as the members that participate in it. The small group of active members eventually get to a point where they suffer from burn-out; overloading the good horse because there is no-one willing to share the load will cause it to fail at some point.

I am often reminded of the words of a previous treasurer of the BMC. “Although the club is a non-profit organisation, if we make a profit it shows that we are doing something right to have got a significant number of our members to participate

in it.” The past couple of years have placed an increased strain on our club.

Covid isolations and regulations have interrupted the way that we have been able to operate the club. Our regular monthly dances and weekly music/song/ yarn sessions have all been impacted. Getting things back to “normal” appears to be a very slow process, with many members obviously wary of the risks involved with active participation. Attempts at using alternative technologies such as Zoom have been helpful, but they have their limitations; nothing beats face to face contact.

The attendance numbers at the last three dances run by the club have barely covered the hall hire costs, let alone those of any bands engaged; participation in the weekly meetings has not returned to pre-Covid levels. Discussions with members of other clubs indicate that this is an experience that is common to all.

Not everyone in the BMC lives in Sydney and is able to attend the functions put on for the benefit of members. For those people who do live in Sydney, there is a wide range of alternative entertainment options that are available to them. A review of our membership’s addresses shows that roughly half the members currently reside outside Sydney.

I made the conscious decision to become actively engaged in the BMC when I became a member over forty years ago. What I found was that the more I put in, the more I got out of it. Pressures of study and work eventually led me to take a back seat for a number of years before becoming more active once more. Nothing has changed. There is still a small number of active members, with the majority remaining silent and hidden.

What do we do?

Some time ago I heard someone speaking on this topic on ABC radio. They said that if each of us could do just one thing for the club(s) that we belong to, the impact would be significant. In this modern world there is a huge variety of activities and things available for us to do; each tries to compete for a share of the available free time that we have. Things were different in the past when we didn’t have such pressures. There was time to stop and have a yarn, sing a song, or play a tune; the internet, television and electronic gizmos did not dictate what we did with our free time.

I realise that not everyone is able to come to Sydney and participate in club functions. The Mulga Wire is one way that everyone can participate in the club. We are always looking for

ways to interact with you, our members. Write and tell us a yarn, poem, song or tune for inclusion in the next edition. If you’ve got some bit of trivia about the origins of something from our rich cultural heritage, then take the time to put it down in print and share it with the rest of us.

Why did you become a member? Write and tell us what brought about this happening. For me, the friends I’ve made and experiences I’ve shared have enriched my life immeasurably.

If you have any ideas of things that we could be doing (or do better), or that you would be willing to be involved in, please let us know. The management team are not mind readers, so telepathic communication doesn’t work! (The thumb nail dipped in tar letter has proved effective in the past, but an email to bmcmail1954@gmail.com is probably a more reliable option.)

The BMC will be at Yeoval on 17th to the 19th February, 2023 to participate in the local Banjo Paterson Festival. If you are able to attend and participate, we would love to see you there. If there’s another location that you think would make for a great weekend away for BMC members to gather and share poems, songs, tunes etc together, please let us know. It would be wonderful if we could arrange a few of these each year so that our “silent” members can become part of our active community. If you are willing to help organise such an event, so much the better.”
